Munsinger Gardens was built on the site of an old sawmill after the city purchased the area in 1915. Through the Works Progress Administration and the dedication of Joseph Munsinger, the park grew and expanded to what it is today – including Riverside Park. Clemens Gardens came about through a true love story, when Bill Clemens purchased the land for his late wife Virginia Clemens, who battled multiple sclerosis for years and who really loved roses. The garden boasts thousands of roses and other flowers, uniquely shaped shrubs and bushes, statues, trellises, fountains and more.

Not far from the Mississippi on a chain of lakes in Richmond, Minnesota, lies the birthplace of the pontoon boat. Invented in 1952 by Ambrose Weeres, the original prototype consisted of a wooden platform on two columns of steel barrels. As their popularity increased and demand skyrocketed, Ambrose started Weeres Pontoons, and was given the nickname “Mr. Pontoon.”

Trout fishing is good on this body of water and anglers can employ many different techniques to tackle trout on this lake. It's recommended that anglers go shallow, because the top 15' of the water is best this time of year, and as the season wears on fish will drop down lower. Also, go slow, as opening day will provide cooler water so trolling speeds should be slow to match the fish's metabolism during this period. Give trout a try!

Spanning 220 acres and housing 20 former granite quarries, Quarry Park and Nature Preserve is a beautiful testament to the industry that put Central MN on the map. All year long visitors can go hiking, rock climbing, fishing, swimming, cross country skiing... there is something for everyone. And still standing today is the Liberty Derrick, which was used in the 1920's – 1940's to hoist heavy granite blocks. It was closed in the 1950's, restored around 2005, and today visitors can view it any time the park is open.

If moonshine had had any rating standards back in the prohibition era of the 20's and 30's, Minnesota 13 - brewed right in Stearns County, Minnesota with the help of people from church leaders to sheriffs - would have ranked highest. Minnesota 13 and the bootleggers that sold it left a legacy in Central MN that can trace back to St. Cloud's very own roots – including at Anton's Restaurant. Anton's is one of the only remaining speakeasy's famous for distributing Minnesota 13, and they proudly display one of the actual old stills used in the brewing process.

Completed in 1922, the 1 ½ mile wall surrounding the St. Cloud Prison was built by the prisoners it enclosed. The granite quarry that provided the materials for building the wall is still inside its premises. It's the longest granite wall in the world, the second longest wall of any kind in the U.S., and it also holds the title of the longest wall in the world built entirely by prisoners.

In 1918 until 1922, the Pan Motor Company would produce around 735 total automobiles, and thus ends St. Cloud's brief stint in the auto manufacturing. Along the short and bumpy road, the company built an entire neighborhood for its employs (which still remains today, known as Pantown), and founder Sam Pandolfo landed himself in prison on mail fraud charges.
